Informal Meeting of Agriculture Ministers

WHEN: 25 - 27 May

WHERE: Maribor; Brdo Congress Center

Topic: legislative proposals and future changes of the CAP

The Slovenian EU Council Presidency's main focus of attention in the field of agriculture is the project of the 'review' of the reform of the common agricultural policy (CAP). In the first stage of the debate, the agriculture ministers agreed on policy guidelines on individual aspects of the review of the CAP reform, laying down a framework for the Commission for the future development of agricultural policy in the period 2009-2013.

At the informal ministerial meeting of the EU Agriculture and Fisheries Council, to be held on 27 May at Brdo pri Kranju, the **Commission will present its legislative proposals** to the Member States. On this occasion, the ministers will open the second stage of the debate on the basis of the legislative proposals with the aim of adopting them by the end of 2008. The informal meeting also provides an opportunity to look at the CAP in the wider context and to concentrate on existing and emerging challenges. The Slovenian Presidency has, accordingly, drawn up a Presidency paper as a basis for the debate.

In this document, the Presidency highlights **climate change, biofuels, environmental protection, risk management in agriculture, and food safety**.

Among the most evident changes is global warming caused by increasing greenhouse gas emissions and changes on the surface of the earth. The greatest risks faced by agriculture are water shortages and extreme weather events, increased frequency of diseases and insect predation. All this will affect crop cultivation, stock farming and forestry. Global warming will exacerbate regional disparities in terms of farming conditions and, in some EU areas, will even result in farming being abandoned. This applies particularly to Southern Europe, the Mediterranean, mountainous areas and floodplains. Agriculture needs to respond to **climate change** by reducing greenhouse gas emissions and adapting production to new climate conditions.

Biofuels are a new challenge for the EU in terms of both tackling climate change and providing greater energy security. It is necessary, of course, to assess the impact of biofuel production on global food safety and to place greater emphasis on the further research and development of second-generation biofuels.

The increasing world population, exceptional economic growth, heightened demand for biofuels and climate change will have an additional impact on the **environment**.

The world faces a significant loss of biodiversity, and water, air and soil pollution is excessive. Environmental protection is a concern not just for the common agriculture policy, which addresses it through rural development measures and cross-compliance requirements, but for other EU policies, too.

We are witness to rising agricultural product prices, due to both demand and supply factors. High food prices affect producers and consumers but also, to the greater extent, countries with high levels of agricultural product and food imports. In some developing countries, the macro-economic and political consequences of high food prices are already apparent. And this is also a reason why **risk management** in agriculture is gaining in importance.

On account of the aforementioned challenges, **food safety** is becoming an increasingly topical issue. If we wish to solve the problem of a food supply sufficient for a growing world population, agricultural production will have to increase. Specific actions are needed in order to enable an immediate response to the increased demand for food.

The Presidency concludes the document by posing **three questions**.

- How can the agricultural sector adjust to these challenges?
- How can we provide quality food at affordable prices while the world population is growing and, at the same time, ensure the preservation of biodiversity, the man-made environment and the protection of natural resources such as water, air and soil?
- To what degree can the envisaged adjustments of the CAP contribute to meeting those challenges?

Turist Elements of the Programmes – Sunday, Monday, 25–26 May

On Sunday, the ministers will visit the **‘Countryside in the City’** event prepared in cooperation with the Chamber of Agriculture and Forestry of Slovenia and featuring presentations of wine producers and farms from Slovenian regions and Slovenians living in neighbouring countries. The event will include folk songs and dances performed by the Academic Folklore Group Študent Maribor, vocal group Srake and the Brass Band of Styria. Guests will be able to taste rustic delicacies and Slovenian wines from all three wine-growing regions. In the evening, they will attend the **cultural programme featuring the band Terrafolk and Symbolic Orchestra** in the hall of the Slovenian National Theatre Maribor.



On Monday morning the ministers will go **rafting on the Drava River**, where they will experience the rafting baptism and enjoy the rafters' lunch (home-baked bread, lard spread, onion, meat conserved in pork fat). The right atmosphere on the raft will be provided by the ethno-folk band 'Pepi Krulet'.

One of the prides of Slovenia is the **oldest vine in the world** growing in Maribor. In front of the Old Vine house, the ministers will be received by its master, the mayor of the municipality of Maribor, Franc Kangler, and by the Wine Queen of Slovenia, Svetlana Šilec. Mrs Fischel Boel and the ministers will receive a scion (grafting) of the Old Vine, a bottle of wine made from it and the relevant certificate. Entertainment will be provided by tenor Timo Ribič.

In the afternoon, the ministers will set out for the rolling hills of Slovenske Gorice and will visit **Protner Tourist Farm** famous for its integrated production of fruit and grapes and for its quality wines. After lunch, they will visit the **Vinag wine cellar** and taste its wines to the musical accompaniment of the Maribor Nonet. In the evening, the ministers and delegates will attend the **formal dinner** hosted by the Slovenian Minister Iztok Jarc and his wife.

In addition, delegates and partners will visit the Maribor Fruit Growing Centre in **Gačnik**, the **Leber-Vračko animal stock and wine-growing farm** and the Dreisiebner wine-growing farm. During the ministerial meeting, they will visit **Bled**, go to Bled Lake Island by boat and see the local castle.

In tandem with the informal meeting of Ministers for Agriculture, we will also host meeting of the Special Committee on Agriculture (SCA). The SCA is a working body which prepares proposals for decisions to be discussed by the EU Council of Agriculture Ministers.

The meeting will focus on the **presentation of environmental impact assessment accompanying legislative proposals in the context of the review of the CAP reform**. In accordance with EU efforts for better regulation, every legislative instrument must be accompanied by an impact assessment to evaluate the impact of the proposed solutions on the issue or area concerned.

The participants at the Special Committee for Agriculture meeting will join the ministers at the **'Countryside in the City'** event featuring the presentations of wine producers and farms from Slovenian regions and Slovenians living in neighbouring countries, folk songs and dances and tasting of rustic delicacies and wines from all three wine-growing regions, as well as attend the **cultural programme with the band Terrafolk and Symbolic Orchestra** in the hall of the Slovenian National Theatre Maribor. They will visit the **'Delicacies of Slovenian Farms' event in Ptuj** where they will be received by Štefan Čelan, the mayor of Ptuj. While the ministerial conference is taking place, they will be hosted by the **municipality of Kranj** and its mayor, Damijan Perne.
